### 1. ROOKIE: An Introduction to the Fire Service

**Green Mountain Catamount Fire Training** 

This course will give new firefighters an introduction to basic skills on how to do firefighting safely. Topics covered: Orientation & History of the Fire Service, Fire Department Organization & Chain of Command, Safety & Protective Equipment, Fire Service Terminology, Chemistry of Fire & Fire Behavior, Classes of Fires & Fire Extinguishers, Orientation to Fire Apparatus, Hose & Appliances, Ground Ladders, Hand Tools, and Ropes & Knots. Firefighters should be physically able to carry out the physical rigors of firefighting.

Pre-requisites: None Equipment needs: PPE SCBA

### 2. Advanced Auto Extrication

**Green Mountain Catamount Fire Training** 

This course covers construction of cars, vans, and pickups. A deeper look at new safety features such as boron, advanced steels and rear glass pistons being discussed. Hand tools will be used along with hydraulics, air bags, reciprocating saws, air chisels and other advanced equipment. Vehicles will be on their wheels, upside down, on their sides, ride-overs and other positions. Students should not take this course unless they have had the Basic course or have considerable experience in their own departments. This is not a course for Rookies.

Pre-requisite: Basic Auto Extrication Equipment needs: PPE

### 3. PPE & SCBA:

### STUDENT MUST BE FACIAL HAIR COMPLIANT NH Fire Academy

After completion of this module, students will be able to describe the Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) that is used by firefighters, explain the importance of PPE, describe how PPE is properly maintained, identify the hazards of smoke and other toxic environments, and explain why respiratory protection is an essential need of fire service personnel. Students will be able to describe the different types of self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA), identify its limitations, explain the procedures for maintenance, inspections, refilling, and donning. Students will practice the skills of donning, doffing, performing inspections and maintenance, and operating in a SCBA. This course includes both classroom and practical skill activities. After the program, the students will participate in SCBA confidence building drills. This course does not completely satisfy the requirements of NFPA 1001 for Firefighter I job performance requirements.

### 4. Basic Pumps

**Green Mountain Catamount Fire Training** 

This course is an introduction to pumps and pump operations. Building on basic pump theory the course will introduce firefighters to basic pump operation and maintenance. Priming drafting will be explored in depth using both classroom theory and practical application. Pump problem troubleshooting and preventive maintenance will be covered. Practical sessions will include work with both portable and main fire pumps.

Pre-requisite: Basic Pumping Knowledge Equipment needs: PPE

PRE-REGISTRATION DEADLINE APRIL 1st, 2020

Today's firefighters must understand the complexities involved in the science of fire and fire dynamics. This updated course uses evidence-based information, derived from modern fire research, to highlight key educational areas. It will provide you the tools necessary to understand modern fire propagation, fuel packages, and ventilation and how they relate to firefighter safety and tactical deployment on today's Fireground. The course begins with a classroom presentation and concludes with a live fire exercise where you observe fire development from ignition to flashover. The culminating live fire exercise will "flip the classroom", where the student will be able to recognize the warning signs of flashover from inside a live fire environment. Prerequisites: All Students must meet the prerequisites for live fire training as outlined in NFPA 1403

Pre-requisite: FF1 or Chief's sign off

Equipment needs: PPE; SCBA; Spare cylinder

### 6. Logger Rescue

Chief Dana Hinkley (Ret.), Logger Rescue LLC.

Topics Covered- Types of logging accidents that can happen and how to be best prepared. Equipment that is needed will be discussed. Chain saw training- its uses and how to best be able to use the appropriate machine. Outside portion will be at an actual job site. Scenarios are put into place and students take the overall safety procedures and do's and don'ts on how best not to become a victim themselves.

COST- \$200 Pre-requisites: None Equipment needs: Hard Hat or Fire Helmet, Safety Toe boots, gloves

### 7. Pediatric Ed for Prehospital Professionals

Mariah Whitcomb, VT EMS DIST 9 - Training Officer

Pediatric Education for Prehospital Professionals- Developed by the American Academy of Pediatrics, PEPP is an exciting curriculum designed to teach prehospital professionals how to better assess and manage ill or injured children. PEPP is a comprehensive, innovative, and highly visual course featuring case-based lectures, live-action video, hands-on skills stations, and small group scenarios. The Advanced Life Support (ALS) course is geared toward the Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT) and Paramedic, a mix of BLS and ALS topics will be covered allowing for all certification levels to participate. **An online pretest** (cost of \$25.00 to American Academy of Pediatrics) is required for this course. Students need to be registered 1 week prior to May 2 & complete the Pre-Test Independently.

### 8. Intro. To Search and Rescue

Neil Van Dyke, Search & Rescue Coordinator, Vt. Dept. of Public Safety

This class will go over the basic skills needed to participate in a search and rescue operation in Vermont. The first day will focus on "Search," including terminology, Initial actions, proper clothing and equipment, and strategy and tactics to locate a missing person in the backcountry. Sunday will provide "Rescue" instruction in basic extrication techniques, including patient packaging and safe litter movement over moderate and low angle terrain.

Equipment needs: Good footwear, leather gloves, clothing for outdoor class- rain or shine; compass and GPS if possible

### 9. Minimum Manpower Operations

**Green Mountain Catamount Fire Training** 

The shortage of physical assets (manpower) is a problem shared by fire departments throughout the country. Our challenge is to operate efficiently and safely with the assets we have on hand. Through classroom instruction and hands on practical sessions this course will provide students with the knowledge and practical experience to formulate Minimum Manpower procedures for their departments.

Pre-requisites: None

Equipment needs: PPE

### 10. Propane Emergency Response

VT HAZ MAT TEAM AND PGANE

This class provides basic information about propane, propane emergency response, and the resources that are available.

### 11. ENHANCING FIRE & LIFE SAFETY EDUCATION IN YOUR COMMUNITY Michael Greenia, VT Div. of Fire Safety

This course is designed to provide information on a variety of fire prevention, public education & community risk reduction topics facing today's fire service. The class is tailored for rural fire department personnel to assist them to identify and evaluate fire prevention needs in their community; develop or utilize other free programs & materials to enhance their existing public education programs. Students will get updates on state fire and life safety education efforts; national and regional organizations such as NFPA, Vision 2020, US Fire Administration and the VT/ NH Carbon Monoxide Alliance. We will examine how to facilitate local collaborative partnerships and how to host a Fire Safe 802 home safety and Smoke /CO alarm install program.

Prerequisite: None Equipment needs: None COST: \$50

### 12. Fire Communications

### **GRAFTON COUNTY DISPATCH**

Fire Dispatch—how calls are made and received, 9-1-1, dispatch call processing, policies, recording, and pre-planning. A discussion about Radio system components and infrastructure—all the parts that make it work, challenges and things that affect performance. Supplemental systems in use—paging, text, automated notification and response monitoring systems. Commercial carriers—their pro's and con's. Interoperable communications—technology challenges vs ICS and operational habits.

The future of communications—including NextGen911, and FirstNet.

Prerequisite: None Equipment needs: NONE COST: \$50

### 13. Accident Scene Management

### **Green Mountain Catamount Fire Training**

Scene Safety, Traffic Control, Triage, Incident Command, Fire Control and Hazardous Materials. These are just some of the issues that responders must address at the scene of a highway accident. This course will address these issues in both classroom and practical exercises.

Prerequisite: None Equipment needs: PPE COST: \$50

### 14. The Firefighters Role In Fire Investigation And Scene Preservation

This course is an overview of fire investigation, with an emphasis on fire officer and firefighter actions during suppression and overhaul to assist with the investigation. The course will show how scene preservation can be achieved by understanding what investigators will be looking for and how tactics may affect this. This course will be presented by members of the Vermont Department of Public Safety Fire and Explosion Investigation Unit.

Prerequisite: None Equipment needs: None COST: \$50.

### 15. Wilderness First Aid - DAY 1

Dr. Will Houghton, Mt. Medicine Education

Patient assessment, delayed care decision-making, care of major patient injuries for extended periods. Day 1 topics include: Wound care, advanced hemostasis, fractures, animal injuries, improvised patient transport, and orthopedic injuries.

**Equipment Needs:** Outdoor class; dress for the weather. Bring a daypack, 8 x 10 rescue tarp, rope, water bottle; "ten essentials you'd bring for any venture into the woods"

### 16. Hazmat Incidents- Tanker Rollover

**NH Fire Academy**

Topics include Scene Safety & Control, Response Priorities & Actions, The Eight Step Process, Implementing Response Objectives, and Decontamination. The NH Fire Academy's portable Hazmat Tanker Simulator will be on-site for some practical evolutions. ### 18. Street Smart Fire Command

Chief Allan Clark, Sugar Hill, NH

This course focuses on the practical aspects of managing typical Fire Department incidents found in northern New England. This not a FEMA, ICS, or NIMS course, but the principles utilized are in conformance with ICS and NIMS. The course creates a system to effectively manage the scene of various incidents ranging in complexity from a dumpster fire, motor vehicle accident, ice rescue, house fire, to a multi-agency hazardous material incident. Emphasis is placed on incidents typical to rural settings based on practicality and not theory. Topics to be discussed will include fire ground management, communications, and accountability, missing firefighter procedure, rapid intervention teams and rehabilitation. The course is fast paced and will cover these topics utilizing local as well as other fires to illustrate and demonstrate the system. Students will have the opportunity to manage several incidents and will be better prepared to manage an incident utilizing practical skills.

Prerequisite: Chief Officers or FF with 5 years of experience

**Equipment needs: None** 

COST: \$50.

### 19. Wilderness First Aid- DAY 2

Dr. Will Houghton, Mt. Medicine Education

Advanced patient assessment, advanced wound care, oral rehydration without IV fluids, hypothermia, heat illness, lightning injuries, advanced improvised transport, head and C-spine care, and medical-rescue-survival kits.

**Equipment Needs:** Outdoor class; dress for the weather. Bring a daypack, 8 x 10 rescue tarp, rope, water bottle; "ten essentials you'd bring for any venture into the woods"
